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Where to live, and how? This exhibition offers a reflection on projects by artists and architects who think about living conditions and challenge this question in their work. These projects come from various contexts that, for the major part, are situated at the junction of architecture and art, Utopia and reality, individual and collective space. Some of these projects document very active emerging urban forms and ask complex economical, political, and social questions which traditional notions of urbanism disregard.

If we think of the city as "a series of strata and styles, of icons and cultural practices which bring together constructions from the past, tradition, as well as these new projects and ideas for the future", can the different projects that will be presented really transform, or at least question, the way specialists, the State and users tackle the problem of living conditions?

Similarly, as the architect Juan Herreros has noted, "housing projects cannot be conceived any longer from the perspective of the systematic expulsion of some populations to the outskirts of the cities. Housing programs must become driving forces in the transformation of the use and image of public space. One shouldn't build only apartment buildings anymore." To establish connections and create exchange networks between concerned actors (artists, architects, politicians and inhabitants) can generate new strategies in term of living conditions.

A reference library will be situated in the work area. It will make available to the public books and documents, selected by the exhibition's participants, as well as fanzines, novels and various brochures. At the end of the symposium, the most significant of the speakers' texts will be collected in a publication edited and overseen by María Inés Rodríguez and Catalina Lozano.

Activation area

For this project, produced in collaboration with the architect Pablo León de la Barra, a workspace entitled "Zone d'activation" (ZdA) will be conceived. It will reunite the constitutive elements of the project: exhibition, library, workspace, symposium, video projection room, each element being independent but belonging to the same ensemble.

The exhibition will be presented at La Casa Encendida in Madrid from September 20 to November 5, 2007; the second part of the symposium will also take place in November (for the program see : www.lacasaencendida.com).

Biographies

Juan Herreros

In charge of the symposium

Spanish architect, tenured Professor at the department of projects of the Escuela Técnica Superior de Arquitectura in Madrid, where he also directs the Master *Vivienda Colectiva*. He is now teaching at Princeton University School of Architecture. Since 1984, he works in collaboration with Iñaki Abalos with whom he has co-signed the following books: *Le Corbusier. Rascacielos, Técnica y Arquitectura en la Ciudad Contemporánea* (published in English by MIT Press under the title *Tower and Office: From Modernist Theory to Contemporary Practice*) and *Natural-Artificial*. Abalos & Herreros' work has received several awards. A book by Gustavo Gili and many articles in specialized magazines have been devoted to it. They have also been featured in many personal and collective exhibitions such as *Scenographies d'architectes*, Pavillon de l'Arsenal, Paris in 2006; *On-Site: New Architecture in Spain*, MoMA, New York in 2006; *Light Construction*, organized by the MoMA in New York in 1995 or *New Trends of Architecture 2002* in Tokyo. Herreros and Abalos are associates and coordinateurs pour l'Espagne de la LMI (Ligue Multimédia Internationale).

Pablo León de la Barra

Scenographer

Born in Mexico in 1972, Pablo León de la Barra lives and works in London. An architect, he also holds a PhD in the history and theory of architecture and works simultaneously as an artist, a curator and a gallerist while always keeping away from the mainstream. His projects question the relationships between art and architecture, center and periphery, relationships that he highlights in the works of other artists as well as his own research. His most recent projects are, among others, *Trial Balloons* (MUSAC, León, 2006), BMW-Ultimere, 9th Baltic Triennal (CAC, Vilnius and ICA, London, 2005) and the Mercosur Bienial (Porto Alegre, Brasil, 2005). Some of his latest exhibitions are *To Be Political It Has To Look Nice* (Apexart, New York, 2003) and *PR04: Tribute to the Messenger* (Puerto Rico, 2004), a project for which he has been part of a team of curators and during which he has conceived the master plan of the Olympic village where the event took place. From 2002 to 2005, he was codirector of the 24/7 Gallery in London, an international gallery, portable and mutant, operating on a very small budget. Pablo León de la Barra is currently working on the event *WC3 White Cubicle Toilet Gallery* (which takes place in the ladies' toilets of the *George and Dragon Public House* in London), he is also the editor of *Pablo International Magazine* and co-director of the gallery *Blow de la Barra* in London.

Catalina Lozano

In charge of publication

Born in Bogotá in 1979, lives and works in Paris. Historian and theoretician of art, she holds a master's degree from Goldsmith College in London and is now working on a PhD at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales (EHESS) in Paris on humor as a political language in Colombian contemporary art. She has worked on public art projects in London and develops independent publication projects at her own expense as well as collaborations with young artists. www.lareinita.org

Maria Inés Rodríguez

Independent curator, lives and works in Paris.

Co-editor of the magazine *Valdez*, she has organized and participated in exhibitions and symposiums on the subject of publishing, among them *Tropical Table Party*, Centro de Arte Santa Monica, Barcelona; *Filière Papier*, *Filière Expo*, Centre d'édition contemporaine, Geneva; *Living-room*, La Rebeca, Bogotá; *Yes*, *en cualquier lugar puede suceder {PR'02}*, *8 signs – 8 days*, M&M projects, San Juan, Puerto Rico. She has also published the magazines *Instant City* and *Bogotham City*, and has written for the numerous magazines: *A-42*, *Atlántica*, *Latinart.com*, *Les Inrockuptibles*, *Beaux-Arts Magazine* and *Art Press*.
